

Greenwater Lake Provincial Park is home to more than 200 bird species and boasts two interpretive trails that are ideal birdwatching sites.

Trails

Marean Lake Birding Trail (1.53 km): A wide trail featuring lookout points, a 5.5 m tall viewing tower overlooking Marean Lake, with a crusher dust surface, rest stops and interpretive signs.

Highbush Interpretive Trail with 2 loops Donald Hooper & Greenwater: Features interpretive signs, rest stops, crusher dust surface, lookout points and benches.

The terrain along the trails can be difficult in areas. Users are encouraged to let someone know about their planned route and estimated return time before heading out. Trail users are also likely to encounter a variety of wildlife along the trails.

Klinger Trail (3.5 km): Joining the two communities of Marean Lake and Greenwater Lake, this trail meanders through dense bush and has scenic views of the lake and shoreline. With base gravel, crusher dust topping, rest areas along the way, and a few bridges including one that is 40 feet long.

The park features over 25 km of intermediate level crosscountry ski trails and more than 100 km of snowmobile trails, all of which are open to hikers in the spring, summer and fall.

Trail Rules


1. Stay on Trail: Stepping off the trail can cause damage to small plants and hidden animal homes.

- 2. Be Prepared: Bring along a backpack with water, a snack and other equipment in case of an emergency.
- 3. Leave No Trace: Do not leave anything behind. The trail should look as though you were never there.
- 4. Be respectful to wildlife: This is their home, not ours. If you encounter wildlife on the trail be sure to keep your distance and give them space.
- 5. Leave it alone if you don't know what it is: There are some plants, berries and mushrooms in the forest that are poisonous and should be avoided.
- 6. Don't touch baby animals: Animal Mothers will often hide their young in the bush or tall grass. It's mother will come back for it.
- 7. Be considerate of other trail users.
