



From large spectator sporting events to a local village celebration, Saskatchewan's community and volunteer spirit is legendary, and it is on display at the many events, festivals, concerts and games that are hosted annually in this province.

Throughout the past year, the COVID-19 pandemic (and resulting health guidelines and gathering restrictions put in place for the safety of the people of this province and those who visit) has forced organizers to cancel or postpone some events. Others have been re-envisioned in new virtual formats, as drive-through events or with reduced capacity to ensure proper physical distancing.

SAFE TRAVEL TIPS*

Practice good hygiene

Handwash frequently or use hand sanitizer when appropriate. Avoid touching your mouth, nose or eyes with unwashed hands. Cough and sneeze into tissue or the inside of your elbow.

· Stay open by staying apart

Physical distance by keeping two metres between yourself and others, both indoors and out. When visiting beaches and parks, groups should be at least four metres apart.

Know before you go

Some tourism businesses and attractions are closed, running at limited capacity or have different operating hours. Plan ahead and confirm that the place you want to visit is open. Know what to expect when you arrive. Respect the new rules and procedures in place to keep employees and customers safe.

Pack the essentials

Limit your impact on the communities you visit by stocking up on essential items before you leave. Put together a clean safety kit – hand sanitizer, face masks (non-medical masks are mandatory in indoor public spaces and outdoors when physical distancing cannot be maintained), disinfectant wipes, first-aid kit, snacks and water.

Travel in small groups

Travelling with fewer people makes practicing physical distancing easier to do and helps lower your impact on the places that you visit.


Support local

TOP TRAVEL IN SOUTHERN SASKATCHEWAN









Maple Creek: The Modern West

Get the full flavour of southwest Saskatchewan hospitality with a visit to the Maple Creek area. Housed in a red cedar log barn, Grotto Gardens Country Market has a bakery, market, gift shop, saskatoon berry orchard and petting zoo. However, the familyrun agri-tourism business is best known for its popular goat yoga. Stroll through Maple Creek's historic downtown and relive your childhood with a stop at Cowtown Kids Toy & Candy. With a focus on selling highquality traditional and nostalgic toys, it has the distinction of being the largest independent toy store in Saskatchewan. Year round, the coffee pot is on and the welcome mat rolled out at Historic Reesor Ranch, located just outside of the West Block boundary of Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park. Help with herd checks and cattle roundups at this century-old working guest ranch. At the end of the day, gather around a crackling campfire to swap stories, while enjoying cowboy poetry by the local bard.

Sea of grass

One of Saskatchewan's two national parks, Grasslands National Park is a 570-sq. km expanse of grassy hills and river valleys. Drive the Ecotour Road and view herds of Plains bison as they roam the land, grazing on native grasses. Black-tailed prairie dogs, pronghorns and various species of snakes make their home here. Stay in one of the park's iconic tipis or an oTENTik. At night, the Milky Way illuminates this designated Dark Sky Preserve. Backcountry hikers and campers will have a field day in the East Block. Backpack your way through the gorgeous, hoodoo-strewn landscape of the Valley of 1,000 Devils or take a drive on the 11-km Badlands Parkway. This new payed route has six scenic viewpoints highlighting some of Saskatchewan's most spectacular

Stay and Play

Glide along the 800 km of shoreline as the wind catches your sail on **Lake Diefenbaker**. Or spend the day waterskiing, fishing, camping or golfing at one of the three

provincial parks (Danielson, Douglas and Saskatchewan Landing) and various regional parks located along the lake. Moor your boat (with or without sails) at Lakeside Marina Service at Elbow and hit some golf balls at Harbor Golf Club & Resort, an 18-hole championship course situated on the bluffs overlooking the lake. You can also enjoy scenic vistas and panoramic views of Lake Diefenbaker while teeing off at Sask Landing Golf Resort and the desert-like, links-style Sage View Golf Course at Palliser Regional Park. This massive lake is one of the premier recreation areas in southern Saskatchewan.

Discover Scotty

Scotty, the world's largest *T. rex* skeleton and the most complete of its kind in Canada, was found in the hills near the town of **Eastend**. The **T.rex Discovery Centre** was built to showcase the rich geological and fossil heritage of southwest Saskatchewan. For the best view of that ancient landscape, drive up to Jones' Peak just outside of the town and gaze out over the valley.







For the birds

Saskatchewan is located on the North American Central Flyway, one of the four major migratory bird routes on the continent. As such, there are enough opportunities for birdwatching that a dedicated birder could spend a summer spotting our feathered friends. The Last Mountain Bird Observatory, situated in North America's oldest nature refuge, is Saskatchewan's only bird monitoring station. The Chaplin Nature Centre, located just off of Trans-Canada Highway 1, is a spot to learn about the 30 species of shorebirds that migrate to Chaplin Lake each summer. The Saskatchewan **Burrowing Owl Interpretive Centre in Moose** Jaw offers the chance to observe these unique birds up close.

Majestic Moose Mountain

Moose Mountain Provincial Park has an extensive trail network for hiking and mountain biking. Pass through the beautiful stands of aspen, birch, green ash and Manitoba maple that characterize this unique southern Saskatchewan forest. Pull out your clubs and hit some golf balls at one or both of the two championship 18-hole courses in the area – Golf Kenosee or White Bear Lake Golf Course.

On the big screen

For a nostalgic way to spend a summer evening, watch a movie on the big screen at one of the province's drive-in movie theatres. Southern Saskatchewan is home to three locations that are preserving this retro pastime. Opened in 1954, Twilite Drive-In Theatre in Wolseley has been an area attraction for decades. Take in a film outdoors under the prairie night sky at

Carlyle's Prairie Dog Drive-In Theatre or catch a show at the recently opened Moonlight Movies Drive-In Theatre in Pilot Butte. In central Saskatchewan, enjoy some buttery popcorn while sitting in the comfort of your own car at Clearwater Drive-In Theatre, near Kyle. Jubilee Drive-in Theatre has been screening blockbusters at Manitou Beach since the 1950s.

Ever-changing canvas

Located north of Trans-Canada Highway 1 near the village of Sceptre, the **Great Sand Hills** rise five storeys above the prairie landscape. The rolling sand dunes cover more than 1,900 sq. km. Mule deer and sharp-tailed grouse live among the native prairie trees, shrubs and grasses in this unique region. This ecologically fragile environment is located on private land. When visiting, respect and obey all posted signs, close gates, and park in designated areas.

Scenic Qu'Appelle Valley

Grab your camping gear and explore the campgrounds and beaches of southeast Saskatchewan. From Regina, drive east through the Qu'Appelle Valley. Take your pick from six lakes – Pasqua, Echo, Mission, Katepwa, Round and Crooked – and cast your line to catch tonight's supper. Throw on some waterskis or strap on a wakeboard and take in the beautiful scenery from behind the boat. Nestled amid white birch and maple trees on the south side of the lake, Echo Valley Provincial Park has hundreds of campsites. Lakeside campsites are available at Crooked Lake Provincial Park.

Get your glamp on

Camp out in style in safari tents or geodesic

domes at Glamping Resorts Ltd., located along the north shore of Buffalo Pound Lake, or stay in a tastefully converted metal grain bin or cosy cabin at Bin There Campground and Events Centre near Moose Jaw. For a fully equipped camping experience, Camp-Easy options are available at the following provincial parks across southern Saskatchewan: Buffalo Pound Provincial Park (two tents), Crooked Lake Provincial Park (one tent), Echo Valley Provincial Park (two tents and one yurt), and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park (two tents). Amp up (or glamp up) your vacation with a stay in one of these unique accommodations.

Shop local

When it comes to shopping off the beaten path, you'll find charming small town storefronts and warm, welcoming shopkeepers everywhere in southern Saskatchewan. Pop in on your way through or plan a day trip to one of these hidden gem boutiques. In Lebret, The Little Glass Hut is a studio and retail shop that features handcrafted stained glass, stepping stones, pottery, quilting, photography, paintings and jewelry. The Sinking Canoe in Indian Head houses a well-curated collection of antiques and an intriguing selection of collectible items in a quaint red cottage barn. In Val Marie, Prairie Wind & Silver Sage is an ecomuseum, café, bookstore and gift shop not to be missed. Aust's General Store, a classic small town country store, sells a little bit of everything - from hardware to underwear. The 4,000-sq. ft. store in Big Beaver has been in the Aust family since 1959 and is a popular coffee stop for locals and visitors in this tiny hamlet. Becky's Place is a unique Indigenous-owned retail and craft





shop located in Fort Qu'Appelle. Purchase beaded gifts, ribbon skirts and shirts, star quilts and blankets, original art and carvings from local artisans. The Farmstand-General Store, in Mortlach, offers beautiful handpicked clothing lines, accessories, housewares and home décor. After stopping for a selfie at Montmartre's popular replica of the Eiffel Tower, visit Sisters' Boutique & Bistro to find women's clothing and accessories, locally consigned art, jewelry, collectibles and rustic pieces of furniture.

Choose your (obstacle) course The kids will be entertained for hours at inflatable waterparks across southern Saskatchewan. The parkour-style floating obstacle courses feature slides, bridges, swings, blobs, teeter-totters, hurdles, ladder runs, and trampolines. Sask Aquatic Adventures has locations at Regina Beach, Danielson Provincial Park, and Buffalo Pound Provincial Park (new in 2021), as well as four (three new) inflatable waterparks across central Saskatchewan. Wild Waves Waterpark is situated at the main beach at Rowan's Ravine Provincial Park. These onwater attractions are for adventure seekers ages five years and up.

Art and Architecture. Art-chitecture? Gravelbourg, a bilingual community in southwest Saskatchewan, is home to Our Lady of the Assumption Co-Cathedral Notre

Dame de l'Assomption. Built in 1918-1919, this national historic site features notable paintings by Monsignor Charles Maillard (painted 1921-1931) and stained glass windows from France. At the Shurniak Art Gallery in Assiniboia, sculptures by esteemed Canadian artists Robert Davidson and Joe Fafard dot the landscaped courtyard and grounds. The gallery houses the impressive art collection of the late Bill Shurniak, amassed during a lifetime of world travel.


Ice Age relic

The Big Muddy Badlands in the southwest are sprawling, intricate hills, valleys and caves that once served as a place of refuge for Chief Sitting Bull, and later as a hideout for outlaws such as Sam Kelly. A relic of the Ice Age, Castle Butte rises 60 m above the surrounding landscape. It is a striking formation that served as a landmark for Indigenous people and members of the North West Mounted Police. Tours of this area are available through Coronach Tourism. Access to Castle Butte is only available from June 1 to November 1. Other unique landscapes in southwest Saskatchewan include the Avonlea Dirt Hills and the Massold Clay Canyons at Claybank Brick Plant National Historic Site.

Ride back in history

Climb aboard and ride the rails! Based in Ogema, Southern Prairie Railway will transport you back in time with style, elegance and a bit of old-fashioned charm. As the vintage locomotive and coach travel through rolling landscapes and grassy hills, listen to stories of a bygone era, when railways criss-crossed southern Saskatchewan and people took the train to visit friends and family. Following your tour, explore the pioneer village made up of 31 heritage buildings and more than 150 pieces of vintage farm machinery at the Deep South Pioneer Museum.

Southern spirits and brews The owners of Smooth 42 Craft Distillery in **Brownlee** bought the local curling rink for \$1 and turned it into a distillery, where they



To see Moose Jaw is to love Moose Jaw. There is no better way to describe the effect that this small but lively city has on visitors. The downtown is packed full of heritage buildings, unique shops and excellent restaurants. There is so much to experience in Moose Jaw that you may want to spend the whole weekend. With its geothermal mineral pool and spa, Temple Gardens Hotel & Spa is one of the city's most famous attractions. Grant Hall Hotel offers fine dining and a boutique vintage hotel experience. At the Tunnels of Moose Jaw, immerse yourself into the world of Prohibition-era bootleggers in the Chicago Connection Tour, or experience the life of a Chinese immigrant working at an underground laundry on the Passage to Fortune Tour. At the Western Development Museum – Moose Jaw, relive history with a ride on the only operating steam locomotive in Saskatchewan. Housed in the restored 1910 Land Titles Building, the Yvette Moore Gallery showcases the work of the internationally renowned painter, along with creations from over 40 western Canadian artisans. Its onsite restaurant, The Gallery Café, serves classic prairie cuisine with an artistic take.





handcraft premium liquor products, such as Cre8 Eco Vodka. In Maple Creek, stop in to Rafter R Brewing's taproom to enjoy a pint or flight of its craft beer brewed onsite. Prairie Bee Meadery is Saskatchewan's first craft meadery. Have a tasting or pick up a bottle of honey wine at its Moose Jaw showroom in the Grant Hall Hotel. Learn how Bandits Distilling Inc. produces 12 flavours of moonshine, vodka and gin during a tasting tour of its facility in Weyburn. Black Bridge Brewery has been filling growlers and serving its selection of craft beer at its taproom in Swift Current since 2014.

Delicious destinations

You can work up a powerful appetite exploring southern Saskatchewan. In the town of **Shaunavon**, **Harvest Eatery** offers one-of-a-kind locally sourced fare and has earned acclaim among foodies and travellers alike. **Solo Italia** brings Italy to the community of **Ogema** with its authentic wood-fired pizza. Big flavour and live music greet you at **The Happy Nun Café** in the hamlet of **Forget**.





As the snow settles in amongst the lush lodgepole pine and white spruce in **Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park**, pull out your crosscountry skis or snowshoes and explore the 17 km of groomed trails in the Centre Block. Winter fun also includes tobogganing, skating, and snowmobiling (only in the designated area in the Centre Block). Open year round, **The Resort at Cypress Hills** has hotel rooms, townhouses and rustic cabins, as well as onsite dining.

Bordering small lakes and scenic viewpoints, **Moose Mountain Provincial Park** has an extensive trail system that allows winter enthusiasts to enjoy the beauty of the park. Travel through this unique southern Saskatchewan forest on 120 km of groomed snowmobile trails, 50 km of ski trails groomed for both classic and skate skiing and 10 km of snowshoe trails. Located in the park overlooking Kenosee Lake, **Kenosee Inn and Cabins** has hotel rooms and cabins available to rent for your snowy getaway.

Throw on your winter jacket, ski pants and helmet and ride the more than 350 km of snowmobile trails in the Qu'Appelle Valley. Strap on your snowboard and clear the frost from your goggles as you take to

one of the 12 runs at Mission Ridge Winter Park, located south of Fort Qu'Appelle. The ski hill also has two terrain parks, a tube park, three conveyor lifts and a triple chair lift. Soak up nature and breathe in the crisp winter air as you skate through the trees at Echo Valley Provincial Park. Skate the Park is a unique 2-km skating trail that winds through the Aspen Campground.

Once the lakes and rivers across southern Saskatchewan freeze, communities of ice fishing shacks pop up. In the southeast, Last Mountain Lake and the Qu'Appelle Valley lakes are favourite ice fishing spots. For a unique catch, Boundary Dam near Estevan is the go-to spot for largemouth bass. In fact, it's the only place to go. Due to the nearby power plant, the water is much warmer, which makes it possible for the species to thrive. One access point for Boundary Dam is Woodlawn Regional Park. Lake Diefenbaker, in the southwest, is another prime location, renowned for its trophysized rainbow trout, as well as the diversity of species found in the lake. Guided packages and luxury RV ice shack rentals are available at Sandy Shores Resort near Danielson Provincial Park.

EYES TO THE SKY IN THE CYPRESS HILLS







When the glaciers retreated, they missed a spot in the southwestern corner of the province, leaving a forested plateau towering high above the plains below at **Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park**. The unexpected mountain-like oasis on the border between Saskatchewan and Alberta reaches an elevation of 1,392 m above sea level, marking the province's highest geographical point.

The mix of landscapes – towering hills, lush lodgepole pine and white spruce forests, and fescue prairie and wildflowers – provides breathtaking views. Take a driving tour to some of the park's most scenic spots, including Lookout Point and Bald Butte in the Centre Block. In the West Block, experience a Saskatchewan sunset from the Conglomerate Cliffs.

In this wilderness area of the park, you can go backcountry camping. Pack your tent, supplies and your horse. In addition to two quiet, rustic campgrounds with few amenities, there is an equestrian campground with corrals. On horseback, witness spectacular vistas as you explore a portion of The Great Trail (formerly the Trans Canada Trail) to see the Hidden Conglomerate Cliffs.


The Great Trail transects the park. In the Centre Block, this trail covers over 16 km of rugged countryside and will challenge the seasoned hiker. With an extensive network of trails in this area of the park, visitors can hike the backcountry to see nature untamed or navigate relaxing self-guided trails with interpretive signage. Paved trails provide quick access between the campgrounds and the beach, resort and swimming pool in the core area.

Wake up to the heady aroma of the lodgepole pine forest in one of the park's six front-country campgrounds that range from basic to full-service. After a full day of swimming at the pool or beach and stand-up paddleboarding or canoeing on Loch Leven, swap stories and make s'more-filled memories with your family around a crackling evening campfire.

The brilliance of the night sky will amaze you if conditions are right for stargazing. The park is a designated Dark Sky Preserve and astronomy programs are offered at the observatory by an astronomer-in-residence.

For those feeling adventurous, one of the popular attractions in the park allows you to experience its beauty (and the forest canopy) by zipline. **Treeosix Adventure Parks** also offers an outdoor climbing wall, treetop drop, electric fat bike rentals, slackline course and minizips for the little ones.

At Fort Walsh National Historic Site, find out what life was like in a working fort during a time that shaped the history of Western Canada. The fort was a North West Mounted Police (NWMP) post established in 1875 and played a key role in imposing law and order in the West. Staff in period costume relay stories about the lawless days of rotgut whiskey runners and Canada's role in the aftermath of the Battle of the Little Bighorn.

A trip to Yorkton

Yorkton is an urban hub of east central Saskatchewan and one of the major centres of Ukrainian settlement in the province. Visit St. Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Church for the beautiful architecture and religious paintings. The Godfrey Dean Art Gallery features contemporary works from Saskatchewan artists. At the Yorkton branch of the Western Development Museum, see an actual settler shack preserved for visitors, and learn the sad story of the Humeniuk carved figures.

In the Outback

Named after the wild carrots that grow along the riverbanks, **Carrot River** will surprise you with its rolling hills, lush summer greenery and charm of its residents. Pasquia Regional Park is home to Big Bert, a 5.8-metre ancestor of the modern crocodile that hunted its prey when Saskatchewan was an inland sea. Just outside of Nipawin, Tobin Lake has gained notoriety as the premier walleye and northern pike fishing lake in southern and central Saskatchewan, and is one of the top walleye lakes in North America. Take a tour of the lake with Aurora Houseboats and relax on the top deck with friends. Pack your clubs and visit a few of the golf courses in the area – Evergreen Golf Course, Rolling Pines Golf and Country Resort and Pasquia Regional Park Golf Course.

Off the beaten path boutiques

Step in to a little shop on the prairie and discover the creative talents of local artisans –

everything from one-of-a kind art to vintage antiques and reclaimed farmhouse fixtures. Poke around for rustic, trendy and refined items, like pottery, jewelry, clothing, books, art and local fare. Located along Highway 16, near Dafoe, Freba Pottery is a small roadside store, where visitors can browse the selection of handcrafted pottery by Marea Olafson and purchase items on the honour system. Freba Pottery also has an online store and pottery subscription boxes. Located in the resort village of Manitou Beach, Little Manitou Art **Gallery** displays the work of more than 100 Saskatchewan artists in five pavilion galleries – all in a garden setting. Kinder Surprises Antiques is housed in a gorgeous hip roof barn near **Davidson** and is jam-packed with beautifully displayed items. Each treasure comes with its own history and story – from

HIDDEN GEMS

It's time for a road trip! You'll find surprising sights and welcoming communities down the highways and back roads of central Saskatchewan. Northwest of the town of Hafford in the Redberry Lake Biosphere Reserve, a boardwalk winds through a landscape of twisting and corkscrewing aspens at the Crooked Bush. A landlocked prairie province is the last place you'd expect to find a lighthouse, but if you take a trip to Cochin, you'll see one with your own eyes. The Cochin Lighthouse was built in 1988 on Pirot Hill overlooking Jackfish and Murray lakes. If you don't know what a bunnock is, take a trip to Macklin and check out the World's Largest Bunnock sculpture that doubles as a tourist information centre. A bunnock is the anklebone of a horse and used in a game of the same name. Each year, the town hosts a world championship tournament that draws more than 1,000 competitors. Remember the childhood thrill of finding a beautiful or unusual stone at the beach or just off a forest path? At the Sesula Mineral and Gem Museum and Rock Shop in Radisson, relive that fascination and discover a trove of gems and minerals. Take a selfie with Canada's biggest bat at Saskatchewan Baseball Hall of Fame in Battleford. With over 4,000 archival materials, the museum displays the province's rich baseball history dating back to 1879.











antiques and reclaimed building parts to glassware and furniture. For almost four decades, the Hand Wave Gallery & Craft Shop in Meacham has been showcasing the work of Saskatchewan craftspeople in gallery exhibitions. Mediums include pottery, textiles, woodwork, jewelry, sculpture, art books, stained/fused and blown glass, prints, photography, quilting and others.

Not your average grain bin

The world is full of unusual accommodations, from an underwater hotel in Zanzibar to glass-ceilinged igloos in Finland, but very few travellers have caught a good night's sleep in a grain bin or converted school bus. At Alive Sky Lodge/BINcredible, guests can choose between a room in the main lodge or the luxury suite inside a metal grain bin. Other options include the Schoolee in the Coulee, the Cowboy Bunkhouse or the BOHO Bunkie. Located an hour's drive west of Saskatoon in Rosetown, Alive Sky Lodge offers a quiet country setting close to urban amenities.

Central eats

One of the joys of road trips and travelling through rural areas is stumbling on great restaurants. Saskatchewan's east central area is rich in these types of finds. Located in a unique and inviting farm setting near Nipawin, Mabel Hill Farm Kitchen & Marketplace offers contemporary Canadian cuisine inspired by global fare and artisanal handmade and homegrown market goods. Enjoy mouth-watering brisket, pulled pork or southern barbecue-style ribs at The Dam Smokehouse in Nipawin. The Spot Restaurant and Lounge, with locations in Nipawin and Tisdale, offers elevated comfort food with gluten-free options. In **Hudson** Bay, The Railway Ave. Pub provides a relaxed atmosphere in which to enjoy signature cocktails, extensive wine and craft beer lists, and delicious pub grub. Stenen's Rawhides Bistro & Saloon is a destination restaurant with an expansive menu and a down-home feeling that will put you at ease.

On the trail of history

At Batoche National Historic Site, discover the lives of Métis residents between 1860 and 1900 – the trails they walked, their homes, their church, which help tell the story of the Battle of Batoche. Fort Battleford National Historic Site represents a period in history when Battleford was the capital of the Northwest Territories. These national historic sites, along with Fort Carlton Provincial Park and Duck Lake, are part of the transprovincial Trails of 1885 initiative.

Prairie performances

Take in dinner and a show in **Rosthern** at the **Station Arts Centre and Tearoom**, a renovated Canadian National Railway station converted into an art gallery, seminar space, tearoom and performing arts theatre. Typically staging performances with a rural theme, its annual summer theatre plays to sold-out audiences on a regular basis. In **Meacham**, **Dancing Sky Theatre** offers professional theatre and dining in a village of 99 people.

Ancient petroglyphs

The Ancient Echoes Interpretive Centre, located near Herschel, is a treasure trove of paleontology, ecology and pre-contact Indigenous civilization. Guided tours take you to Coal Ravine, where you will find a buffalo rubbing stone, buffalo jump, buffalo processing area, and various stone circles. Three petroglyphs with ceremonial markings, available by guided tour only, are believed to have had religious significance and provide a window into Indigenous culture.

Floating on salt, dancing on (h)air
There are hidden gems, and then there is
Manitou Beach. The intense mineral
concentration of Little Manitou Lake draws
people from around the world for the water's
reputed healing properties. Manitou Springs
Resort & Mineral Spa allows you to try out
the waters in a relaxing indoor pool. After a
soak, put on your dancing shoes and kick up

your heels at **Danceland**, an old-fashioned dance hall with one of the last horsehair-sprung dance floors in North America.

Railroad adventures

At one time, Saskatchewan had a robust network of regional passenger trains connecting small communities. Today, you can experience the comfort of railroad travel via the Wheatland Express Excursion Train. The tourist train runs on the Wheatland Railway short-line along Highway 2 between the towns of Cudworth and Wakaw. Enjoy dining, entertainment and the pleasure of relaxing and watching the rolling prairie landscape go by. Themed rides include tasting excursions, medieval feasts and maybe even a train heist.

A little culture in the Battlefords

View powerful images of the Northern Plains Cree through the art of renowned Indigenous artist Allen Sapp at the Allen Sapp Gallery/The Gonor Collection in North Battleford. Sapp's real-life depictions of his past have been seen around the world and earned the late artist provincial and national recognition, including the Order of Canada. At the North Battleford branch of the Western Development Museum, tour a working 1920s-era village and farm with a fully preserved grain elevator.

Along the border

Straddling the boundary of Saskatchewan and Alberta, **Lloydminster** boasts a mix of homespun hospitality with big city amenities. The city's historic downtown is home to more than 100 retailers, restaurants and services. Spend the day exploring the **Lloydminster Cultural & Science Centre**, featuring an art gallery, antique museum, wildlife display and heavy oil science centre. In nearby **St. Walburg**, visit the **Imhoff Museum & Art Gallery**. Count Berthold von Imhoff's paintings grace cathedrals and churches across North America, including **St. Peter's Cathedral** near **Muenster**.

WHEN THE SNOW FALLS

Discover a hidden winter wonderland as you explore central Saskatchewan by snowmobile. After a day of riding through untouched powder and witnessing breathtaking scenery, warm up in one of the shelters along the trail. Communities and parks throughout the northeast, such as Hudson Bay, Carrot River and Greenwater Lake Provincial Park, offer access to some of the province's most cherished trails. Further south, Duck Mountain Provincial Park has 70 km of snowmobile trails with varied terrain.

Pull out the downhill skis and hit the slopes or put on a snowboard and grind rails at one of the region's ski hills – Table Mountain Regional Park, Wapiti Valley Regional Park and Duck Mountain Ski Area. For those who prefer to cross-country ski, hundreds of trails wind through parks and forests, across open prairie, over rolling hills and in and around cities and towns. Eb's Cross-Country Ski Trail near Duck Lake is popular with more than 50 km of groomed trails. Five cosy warm-up shelters greet cross-country skiers on the 60 km of maintained trails at Duck Mountain Provincial Park.

With a three-month season (mid-December to mid-March), opportunities for winter anglers to get out on the ice are countless. There are an abundance of great fishing lakes across central Saskatchewan. With a world-record ice fishing catch in the books, **Tobin Lake**, near



Nipawin, should be one of your go-to spots for that trophy walleye.





TOP TRAVEL IN NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN



Park life

Prince Albert National Park is 3,875 sq. km of adventure, leisure and discovery, where parkland meets boreal forest. The park is one of Saskatchewan's most popular four-season destinations, a place where you can mix northern wilderness encounters with the comforts of a lakeside resort. Full-service camparounds are available, as well as rustic sites and backcountry camping. The charming resort village of Waskesiu has a wide range of services, accommodations, dining options and unique boutiques and shops. Recreation is the name of the game here with more than 150 km of hiking trails, six beaches for swimming scattered around Waskesiu Lake and golfing on one of the province's most picturesque and challenging layouts - the 18-hole Waskesiu Golf Course. For those who prefer golf of the mini variety, Little AL's Mini Golf is a recent addition to the park. Waskesiu Marina Adventure Centre offers watercraft rentals, interpretive cruises and guided adventures to Grey Owl's Cabin.

Lights, sand, action!

Candle Lake Provincial Park is named after a legend that speaks of mysterious lights appearing on its north shore. It is also known for its crystal-clear water, numerous beaches, fragile drifting dunes and abundant wildlife. Soak up the sun on the white sand of Minowukaw Beach or encounter an unexpected sight along Candle Lake's shoreline – a purple sand beach. Hit the greens and spend the afternoon tackling the challenging course carved through the forest at Candle Lake Golf Resort.

Luxury lodging

At Elk Ridge Resort, indulge in first-class comfort with a stay in one of its upscale accommodation options – the lodge, log cabin, townhouse or cottage. Start your day with a massage or pedicure at Drift Spa + Wellness before you head out for a round on the championship 27-hole golf course, where it's not uncommon to see an elk on the fairway. Enjoy fine dining set amidst rustic

elegance at Fireside Dining Room and Terrace. The restaurant's patio has a spectacular pond view. Also onsite, The Wyld at Elk Ridge is the resort's newest dining experience.

Eskers and emerald waters

Known for their dazzling reflections of jade and aquamarine, the Gem Lakes are a haven for brook, rainbow and brown trout. Exotic hybrids, such as splake and tiger trout, also roam these waters and are known to put up a fight that may leave your hands trembling. The Gem Lakes are only one corner of Narrow Hills Provincial Park, where dozens of lakes locked in pristine wilderness hold northern pike, walleye and more. Take the Narrow Hills Scenic Drive and get a bird's-eye view of this scenic vista comprising boreal forest and clear lakes that stretch for miles and miles.

Northwest wilderness

The **Boreal Trail** in **Meadow Lake Provincial Park** spans an epic 120 km, east to west across the park. This destination backpacking trail









traverses through wild and varied ecosystems within the northern forest. Backcountry campsites are available throughout the trek and numerous entry-exit points are available for shorter hikes. If you have the family in tow, cool off at the beach and camp at Kimball Lake or stay at Waters Edge Eco Lodge on Greig Lake. FireSong Resort is a luxury vacation rental property located on the shores of Fowler Lake, near Makwa Lake Provincial Park.

Wild West

Catch a ride western-style and travel the trails on horseback with **Sturgeon River Ranch**. Visit the Wild West side of **Prince Albert National Park** and see one of Canada's only free-ranging herds of Plains bison within its historic habitat. The scenery along the trails is incredibly varied, ranging from big open meadows and grassy knolls, to narrow forest paths and crystal-clear rivers and lakes. Guided tours range from three-hour horseback and wagon trips to multi-day backcountry excursions.

The voyageurs' path

There are countless canoe routes in northern Saskatchewan, many of which have been used since before the fur trade. Paddle through distinct ecoregions that exhibit unique terrain, flora and fauna, past boiling rapids and ancient pictographs. In Lac La Ronge Provincial Park, dip your oar into the Churchill River and discover a tangible sense of history that permeates the land and water. Tranquil lakes, roaring falls and a sense of serenity are the allure of the North. With a drop of 24 m, one of the province's highest and most beautiful waterfalls – Nistowiak Falls – is located along this river's route.

Fishing the shield

Hanson Lake Road is dotted with highquality drive-in lodges where you can catch the fish of your dreams. Resorts at Little Bear, Deschambault and Jan Lakes offer cabin accommodations, while recreation sites and campgrounds are found along the way. Near Creighton and Denare Beach, see the limestone crevices along Amisk Lake's south shore. Formed by coral in an ancient seabed, the ground was pried apart by repeated freezing and thawing, creating a labyrinth of moss and stone.

Gateway to the North

Explore Little Red River Park, located on the edge of **Prince Albert**. Hike or bike the more than 30 km of nature trails that wind through the 500-hectare forest park. Nestled in the spruce, the Cosmopolitan Lodge is home to The Knotty Pine Bistro, a contemporary family-style restaurant. For a full tour of the city by trail, take the Rotary Trail. With its 23 km of paved pathways, this urban trail encompasses the city of Prince Albert -Saskatchewan's oldest city - and travels along the historic North Saskatchewan River. One stop along the path is Alfred's Playground at the Alfred Jenkins Fieldhouse. At 17,000 sq. ft., it is the largest accessible playground in Canada.







Sacred history

Situated prominently on the banks of the Churchill River in the northern community of Stanley Mission, the Holy Trinity Anglican Church is the oldest building in

Saskatchewan. Built in a Gothic Revival style, the church was constructed between 1854 and 1860 from hardwood logs cut by local

Indigenous peoples and features stained glass imported from England.

Flying high

Get your adrenaline pumping by soaring up to 21 m above the ground on a two-hour zipline tour at the Waskesiu location of Treeosix Adventure Parks. With seven lines,

an outdoor climbing wall, slackline park, giant swing and spikeball court, prepare to see the forest from a new vantage point. Recent additions to basecamp activities include axe throwing and electric fat bike rentals.

Natural wonder

In the remote north, Saskatchewan's largest lake is home to the Athabasca Sand Dunes. These billowing sands stretch for 100 km along the south shore of Lake Athabasca and are the world's most northerly dunes. Aside from the striking view, this protected park is home to a fragile and unique ecosystem rich in rare and endemic (only found here) plants. The area is accessible by floatplane only and recommended for experienced wilderness users, as there are no onsite services. Guided tours by licensed outfitters are available.

Furs and wares

Roll your fingers over the intricate beadwork on a fur-lined moccasin or beautiful handstitched suede purse. Lose yourself in the delicate patterns of authentic birch bark bitings. Marvel at the sight of raw furs. Robertson Trading Ltd. in La Ronge will take you back in time to an era of traders and trappers. Though the store still buys and sells furs, you can find all of the modern camping gear, groceries and supplies you need. Continuously in business as a trading company for more than 300 years, The North West Company in Prince Albert is a fur depot that sells unique handcrafted Indigenous aoods.



Enjoy the cosy comfort of The Yeti Yurt or Betty's Abode at Flora Bora Forest Lodging near Emma and Christopher Lakes. The beautifully crafted and thoughtfully designed yurts – circular tents built from wood and canvas, originating from Central Asia – are the perfect place to become one with nature. Large and small yurts are available for rent at Nesslin Lake Campground. Prince Albert National Park offers oTENTiks, a cross between an A-frame cabin and prospector tent that kids will love. Camp-Easy options are available at a number of northern provincial parks. New to camping? Ease into outdoor adventures with a stay in a yurt at Narrow Hills Provincial Park, Meadow Lake Provincial Park or Great Blue Heron Provincial Park (upgraded Mongolian yurt).







Embrace winter surrounded by the beauty of northern Saskatchewan. Adventures await at some of the province's most popular parks and four-season destinations in the snowy season.

While the Alaskan huskies bark and yelp around you, snuggle in your sled with a blanket and wait in anticipation as your musher readies the team for takeoff. Located on the southern edge of the boreal forest in Great Blue Heron Provincial Park, Sundogs **Excursions** offers afternoon trips and overnight dogsledding adventures.

This area is ideal for snowmobiling. The Lakeland snowmobile trail system encompasses more than 350 km of groomed trails in and around Great Blue Heron Provincial Park and connects with Elk Ridge Resort. With local trails ranging from 7 km to 120 km in length, riders of all ages can suit up for this family-friendly winter activity. After a day of sledding, nothing beats roasting a hotdog and enjoying a hot chocolate at one of the warm-up shelters along the trail.

Breathe in the fresh northern air as you head out for a cross-country ski or snowshoe at Elk Ridge Resort. Experience the boreal forest in all of its winter glory as you glide through or hike the resort's more than 10-km groomed trail system. Then strap on some skates or grab a broom and rocks and curl (or crokicurl) a few ends. The lodge overlooks a frozen pond with a skating loop and hockey rinks, as well as a curling sheet. Before the day is done, hit the resort's toboggan hill where you can jump on a tire tube and race to the bottom.

At nearby Prince Albert National Park, explore winding, scenic trails on cross-country skis or by snowshoe. Hit the ice for some indoor skating at the Paul G. Horne Memorial Arena or venture out on the

frozen lake for some ice fishing. Look up and be enchanted by the northern lights and starry sky as you set up camp at one of the two front-country winter campgrounds, located along the shores of Waskesiu Lake.

Northeast of Big River, the Ness Creek Site, home to music festivals and cultural events in the summer, transforms into a winter oasis hidden in the boreal forest. The site has 10 winterized cabins, designed and furnished to keep visitors cosy through all seasons. Onsite activities include ice skating and 25 km of groomed crosscountry skiing and snowshoeing trails. At nearby Ski Timber Ridge, hit the slopes for some downhill skiing and snowboarding. The hill has six runs and a snowboard park.

Another option for downhill skiing and snowboarding is the Kinsmen Ski and Snowboard Centre in Prince Albert's Little Red River Park. It has two beginner hills and one intermediate run. Little Red River Park boasts more than 30 km of forest trails and is a cross-country skier's dream with 12 groomed tracks of varying difficulty. Other popular winter activities in the park include tobogganing and snowshoeing.

In the province's northwest, Meadow Lake Provincial Park is the ideal location for winter adventure. With more than 20 lakes, rivers and streams within its boundaries, the park has no shortage of ice. Set up a hut, drill some holes and spend the afternoon ice fishing. Explore the expansive park by snowmobile on more than 115 km of trails - 40 km of which are groomed. Make Waters Edge Eco-Lodge at Greig Lake your home base as you spend the day snowshoeing, cross-country skiing or skating. A winter getaway to FireSong Resort at Fowler Lake includes cosy, comfortable cottages and crackling fires. The holiday resort near Makwa Lake Provincial Park has ice fishing, skating, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.









Northern Saskatchewan, with its rolling parklands, boreal forests and maze of waterways, is full of trails to discover. Here are a few to get you started, from short loops to multi-day excursions. Lace up those boots, and remember to respect and keep an eye out for wildlife on the trails.

Narrows Peninsula Trail, Prince Albert National Park, 3-km loop This rolling trail features an ostrich fern bed and expansive views of Waskesiu Lake.

Gem Lakes Trail, Narrow Hills Provincial Park, 5.5 km

Discover steep, treed valleys among five sparkling little lakes named after precious stones – Jade, Diamond, Opal, Sapphire and Pearl. Brilliant fall colours reflect on the mirror-like lake surfaces.

Kimball Lake Trail, Meadow Lake Provincial Park, 6.5-km loop The Kimball Lake Trail loops from the Kimball Lake campsite and circles around Raspberry Lake, which is stocked with brown trout.

Nut Point Trail, Lac La Ronge Provincial Park, 30 km


Nut Point Trail follows a long peninsula through dense forest, rocky outcrops and muskeg typical of the Canadian Shield. Camp in the Nut Point Campground or hike out to Nut Point and stay the night.

Grey Owl's Cabin Hiking Trail, 40 km

Make your way to Ajawaan Lake and the home of Archibald Belaney, aka Grey Owl. The conservationist lived there with his partner Anahareo and their pet beavers, Jellyroll and Rawhide. This is a two-day hike, so pack accordingly.

Boreal Trail, Meadow Lake Provincial Park, 120 km

On the Boreal Trail, watch birch leaves turning, see rocky cliffs and wander along the shores of northern Saskatchewan's massive lakes. A variety of start and end places and well-maintained backcountry campsites are available here.





Urban sanctuary

Paddle out on a canoe, kayak or stand-up paddleboard to one of Wascana Lake's many constructed islands, or take a leisurely cruise with Ferry Boat Tours. Wascana Centre, one of the largest urban parks in North America, is an oasis in the middle of the city and an excellent venue for walking, cycling and jogging. The park is also home to the 23-acre Wascana Lake Migratory Bird Sanctuary, where you might spot some wild creatures, from painted turtles and wetland birds to pelicans and cormorants.

New dino in town

Move over, Megamunch. The **Royal Saskatchewan Museum**'s newest star attraction has arrived. Scotty, the world's largest and oldest *Tyrannosaurus rex*, has made the Regina museum a second home (the first is the T.rex Discovery Centre in Eastend). This scale replica is so massive that it required major redevelopment of the museum to allow for two-storey viewing of the dinosaur skeleton.

Salute the serge

The RCMP Heritage Centre brings to life one of Canada's oldest and most iconic stories, the story of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. While the museum is modern, its setting on the grounds of the RCMP Academy, "Depot" Division, is steeped in history. Established in 1885, "Depot" Division is considered the "Cradle of the Force," with all RCMP members from across Canada receiving their training in Regina. Explore over a century of history, from the formation of the North West Mounted Police in 1873 to the modern day

Mountie. In the exhibit hall, check out the Musical Ride virtual reality experience or get behind the wheel of the driving simulator.

For art's sake

Spend a leisurely afternoon browsing works of art in some of Regina's galleries. Located in the T.C. Douglas Building, the MacKenzie Art Gallery features thought-provoking creations from around the world. Get lost in your thoughts in over 2,000 sq. m of gallery space, or browse the giftware in The Gallery Shop. Also visit the Art Gallery of Regina and the Dunlop Art Gallery at the Regina Public Library. Private galleries, such as Slate Fine Art Gallery and Nouveau Gallery, pepper the downtown and Cathedral Village areas.

At the market

On Wednesday and Saturday mornings in the summer (May to October), head to City Square Plaza in Regina's downtown and pick up some fresh local produce, delicious baking and original crafts at the **Regina Farmers'**Market. In addition to the open-air markets, the Regina Farmers' Market offers its goods year round via the RFM Online Store.

Rider Pride

For a real sense of Regina's community spirit, take in a Saskatchewan Roughriders football game. "Rider Pride" is a phenomenon well worth experiencing. Fans flock to Saskatchewan Roughrider games all over Canada, but there's nothing quite like sitting in Mosaic Stadium, surrounded by cheering fans wearing green and white jerseys and helmets carved from watermelons. Take home a game day memento with a visit to

the Rider Store. Saskatchewan Roughrider season dependent on COVID-19 health guidelines and gathering restrictions.

A splash of Victorian elegance

Step back in time and admire turn-of-thecentury elegance while exploring Government House Museum and Heritage Property, which was built in 1891 to house the Lieutenant Governor of the Northwest Territories. Now it's home to a museum, a conservatory and formal Edwardian Gardens.

Straight from the tap

Over the last few years, Regina's craft brewing scene has become an attraction all its own. In the Warehouse District, award-winning Bushwakker Brewpub serves its signature beers with next-level pub grub. Rebellion Brewing Co.'s inventive brewers are always coming up with something new. Try some of its limited seasonal offerings in its taproom and leave with a growler. Located in the iconic Weston Bakery building, Warehouse **Brewing Company**'s beer hall is the perfect place to belly up to the bar or hang out on the patio with a pint, taster, or flight. Close to Regina's downtown, Malty National Brewing Corp. has its assortment of creative brews on offer. Enjoy a locally produced beer at Pile O' Bones Brewing Co., founded by four awardwinning homebrewers who are committed to using the best quality ingredients in their handcrafted beers.

Prairie politics

Constructed in 1912, the **Saskatchewan Legislative Building** is one of the grandest buildings in Western Canada. Designed by







the Maxwell Brothers of Montreal in Beaux-Arts style, the building was constructed with Manitoba Tyndall stone and 34 types of marble. Take a tour to learn about the vision that early leaders had for the province and the many famous Canadians who are a part of Saskatchewan's political legacy. To discover points of historical interest on the grounds near the Saskatchewan Legislative Building, take a 45-minute self-guided tour through Wascana Centre.

Free your mind

Located in a century-old, decommissioned power plant, the Saskatchewan Science Centre features more than 185 hands-on exhibits of history, nature and technology. Take in an interactive stage show or watch an IMAX movie on the giant screen.




The variety in Regina's culinary scene will delight even the most seasoned of foodies, with restaurants ranging from out-of-the-way diners to awardwinning upscale eateries. Prairie-inspired cuisine and fabulous cocktails await at the impeccably designed Avenue Restaurant. The food and atmosphere netted the downtown restaurant a place in Canada's 100 Best Restaurants 2019. Chef Jonathan Thauberger of Crave Kitchen and Wine Bar creates flavourful cuisine in the elegant setting of the old Assiniboia Club on Victoria Avenue. Located on the edge of Regina's downtown, Caraway Grill is the perfect spot to indulge in top-notch Indian food for lunch or dinner (or both!). With old-fashioned china plates and tea towels for napkins, Homestead Bar à Vin winks at tradition but with a unique selection of great wines and delicious shared plates. Award-winning chefs Milton Rebello and Louise Lu serve lunch and weekend brunch at Skye Café & Bistro, in the Saskatchewan Science Centre. For dessert, have a signature sourdough doughnut at The Everyday Kitchen, a creative pint at Dandy's Artisan Ice Cream, or a classic cone at

Milky Way Ice Cream.

WHEN THE SNOW FALLS

Snowshoe through Wascana Centre or strap on skis and travel the park's many pathways in cross-country style. The city of Regina boasts almost 14 km of groomed ski trails for people of all ages and skill levels. The trails are located at various sites, including Douglas Park, Kinsmen Park, Les Sherman Park and AE Wilson Park. Outside of the city, White Butte Trails Recreation Site has 13 km of trails in treed sections of gently rolling hills, while the Wascana Valley Nature Recreation Site has 15 km of trails for skiing and snowshoeing.

With over 80,000 sq. ft. of ice surface, Iceville presented by SaskTel is an outdoor rink like no other. Lace up your skates and take to the field (well, ice) at Mosaic Stadium. Take part in après-skate with a warm beverage and bite to eat at The Chalet, located in the Harvard Lounge.



VISIT THE VALLEY: A DAY TRIP TO LUMSDEN

Some vacations take months of planning and weeks away from home, but you can turn a quiet Saturday into a spontaneous day trip. Take your friends, fill your tank and discover a few hidden gems in the town of Lumsden, just a 15-minute drive from Regina.









FOOD AND DRINK Last Mountain Distillery

Are you curious to find out exactly how a handful of grain becomes a glass of spirits? Take a tour of Last Mountain Distillery with owners Colin and Meredith Schmidt, who will walk you through the process and even let you in on the secret of their famous dill pickle vodka (hint: it's dill). Pick up a bottle of spirits made from Saskatchewan grain on your way out.

Free Bird

Free Bird's philosophy is "common food done uncommonly well." Serving brunch, lunch and dinner, the menu features unique takes on fried chicken, shrimp tacos, pizza and burgers.

Over the Hill Orchards and Winery

Not far from Lumsden is Over the Hill Orchards and Winery, a certified organic fruit grower. The orchard may be best known for its tangy Prairie Cherry products and selection of fruit wines. Take in a tour or tasting or indulge in a gourmet meal prepared by a guest chef at one of its weekend Supper in the Orchard events.

Jane Dough's Bakehouse and Coffee Company

Jane Dough's Bakehouse and Coffee Company is a bakery specializing in simple, soul-warming baking and daily breakfast and lunch menus – think carrot cake and soups and stews served in hollowed-out bread bowls. Its owner, Jane, sources all of her ingredients locally, and everything is madefrom-scratch. The bakery's cinnamon buns are a local favourite.

Iron Bridge Brewery

Iron Bridge Brewery is a family-run, small-batch brewery that opened its taproom doors in Lumsden in 2020. It serves its own beer, along with other Saskatchewan-made craft beers and wines, and has a limited food menu on offer.

SHOPPING

Thr3e Clothing Connection

On James Street, Thr3e Clothing Connection offers a curated collection of trendy and timeless styles for everyday wear, and has racks and racks of beautiful and stylish clothes, shoes and accessories for women.

The Painted Parasol Gift & Toy



Lumsden Florist

Lumsden Florist is a quaint little shop located in scenic downtown Lumsden. It offers unique, quality flower designs, a wide selection of plants, DIY workshops and kits, and gift options, such as throw pillows, coffee cups, jewelry and purses.

OTHER STOPS

While daytripping, visit the market gardens located on the highway between Lumsden and Craven – Corn Maiden Market at Lincoln Gardens and Frontier Gardens.







Picasso by the water

The Remai Modern, considered one of North America's most visionary new art galleries, features dazzling exhibits from artists around the globe, including the world's largest collection of Picasso linocuts. From the outside, the gallery makes a bold statement with its award-winning architecture. Step through the doors and explore its collection of more than 400 Picasso linocuts and 23 ceramic works, as well as temporary and touring exhibitions of modern and contemporary art.

A river runs through it

Stop and smell the wildflowers along the Meewasin Valley Trails. More than 80 km of riverbank paths wind through the city along the tree-lined banks of the mighty South Saskatchewan River. Walk, jog, cycle or sit and enjoy the many landscaped parks and natural areas Saskatoon has to offer. Or see Saskatoon from the water on the top deck or inside the heated cabin of The Prairie Lily. Let Prairie River Cruises be your guide as you enjoy the beautiful scenery. Enjoy a relaxing afternoon tour or dinner cruise and gain a unique perspective of the city.

Savour Saskatoon

Saskatoon is filled to the brim with great restaurants. In the historic Riversdale neighbourhood, **Odd Couple** offers Asian fusion cuisine, while **Leyda's Café** serves gluten-free and nut-free food. **Primal** serves handmade pasta dishes using Saskatchewan heritage grains and whole animal butchery. **Sticks and Stones** is all about Korean-inspired cuisine and cocktails. **Ayden Kitchen & Bar** is the city's premier downtown dining destination. **Shift** offers elevated Canadian comfort food at the Remai Modern art gallery. A casual, neighbourhood gem in Saskatoon's

Nutana district, **Hearth Restaurant** offers a comfortable atmosphere and delicious food made with locally sourced ingredients.

Many waters

See Saskatoon from a whole new perspective as you canoe, kayak or stand-up paddleboard into the city on the South Saskatchewan River. Running from **Gardiner Dam** at the northern tip of **Lake Diefenbaker** to the city of Saskatoon, the 105-km **Chief Whitecap Waterway** takes you through the beautiful river valley.

Bring the kids

Saskatoon is full of places where children can have a great time (and the grown-ups can relax a little bit). Pack up the kids and head down to the river. Cool off on a hot summer day at the Saskatchewan River Basin Water Play Feature at River Landing. At the Saskatoon Forestry Farm Park and Zoo, visit the Kinsmen Bear Exhibit and you may see grizzly bears Mistaya and Koda wrestling, digging or playing in their pond or meet the two playful dingoes Euci and Maple. At the Nutrien Wonderhub, the Cosmic Commotion exhibit is a truly tactile experience. Kids can pop through holes in the climbing structure's web-like surface, or swing from dangling crocheted pods. Visit Nutrien Playland at Kinsmen Park and go for a ride on the ferris wheel for a bird's eye view of the city, or take a whirl on the colourful carousel. At Wilson's Lifestyle Centre/Stoked Centre, rip around on high-speed electric go-karts, fly high on the 61-m zipline, challenge yourself on the suspended obstacle course and let the little ones jump in bouncy castles.

Feel the Rush

Feel the excitement as the **Saskatchewan Rush Lacrosse Club** takes to the field at

SaskTel Centre and welcomes National Lacrosse League (NLL) teams from across North America. Saskatchewan Rush games are fast-paced and energetic, with plenty of music and spectacle. There's nothing like being in a sold-out arena watching an intense game surrounded by passionate fans. The NLL season runs from December to April. Saskatchewan Rush season dependent on COVID-19 health guidelines and gathering restrictions.

Knock one back

At Saskatoon's many breweries and distilleries, you'll find award-winning spirits and ales brewed with locally grown ingredients, as well as an overall level of quality born from passion and commitment to craft. A small but mighty brewery in Riversdale, 9 Mile Legacy Brewing Company was named after the nine-mile stretch between the founders' family farms. Paddock Wood Brewing Co. was established in 2002, and is one of Saskatchewan's first, major microbreweries. High Key Brewing Co. makes traditional ales and porters, with surprising seasonal beers like the Pomegranate Pale Ale. On Broadway Avenue, Prairie Sun Brewery has a reputation for excellent beer made with Saskatchewan-influenced flavours. Shelter Brewing Company labels itself as a "nano brewery," with four core brews and three rotating taps. Before you ask what "LB" stands for, know that the company's founders parlayed a lucky lottery ticket into an awardwinning distillery. LB Distillers carries a full line of cocktail-ready spirits, liqueurs and bitters. One of the city's newest distilleries, Stumbletown Distilling boasts the first vodka made with 100 per cent locally grown Saskatchewan purple wheat.



Do the Dunes

Soak in the spectacular views of the award-winning golf course and South Saskatchewan River valley from the indoor rooftop pool at the newly built Dakota Dunes Resort & Casino. Located on Whitecap Dakota First Nation, south of Saskatoon, the 155-room resort stands as a tribute to its Indigenous heritage with angular window trims and exterior wood panels echoing the traditional tipi. This thoughtful nod to the culture carries through to the hotel's quest rooms by way of art and design. The fullservice resort also includes a 10,000-sq. ft. conference centre, the Moose Woods Home Fire Grill, which offers a farm-to-table dining experience, and an exhibit corridor leading to the curated Wanuskewin Gift Shop, where you can purchase unique, handcrafted items made by local Indigenous artisans. While enjoying a stay at the resort, hit the gaming floor at the Dakota Dunes Casino or pull out the clubs for a round at the 18-hole Dakota Dunes Golf Links. Other first-class golf courses in Saskatoon and area include The Willows Golf & Country Club and The Legends Golf Club in Warman.

Boomtown

Imagine yourself washing clothes on a scrub board, stoking the fire in the cook stove and shopping in the general store as you explore the lives of Saskatchewan's early settlers at **Western Development Museum** – **Saskatoon**. 1910 Boomtown, the life-size re-creation of a main street from yesteryear, also boasts a priceless collection of antique automobiles and a working exhibit, the Boomtown Café.



Walk back in time through 6,000 years of history of the Northern Plains people at Wanuskewin. Follow the Path of the People, explore the Trail of Discovery or climb to the east prairie along the Trail of the Bison. Follow the Bison Viewing Trail to the lookout point to see the Plains bison herd that was recently reintroduced to its ancestral homeland. Through the centre's immersive programming and expanded exhibits, learn about the cultural significance of the animal, as well as the bison herd's journey back to Wanuskewin. Try some traditional Indigenous cuisine with a contemporary twist at the refreshed restaurant, or browse the well-curated gift shop and art gallery. Experience a special evening at one of Wanuskewin's popular Han Wi Moon dinners. The outdoor dining event treats guests to a decadent meal made from foraged and locally sourced ingredients, served at sunset, followed by a campfire with storytelling. Other cultural experiences at the park include archeological tours, native plant walks, and tipi sleepovers. For the kids, a new interpretive playground was designed to incorporate the historical significance of the site and the many Indigenous nations that have gathered there for living, hunting, gathering, and spiritual



The **Meewasin Valley Trails** become a winter wonderland once the snow flies. Pull out your cross-country skis or snowshoes and explore the city in all seasons. Glide along the groomed trails at Holiday Park and Wildwood golf courses.

Lace up some skates and take to the ice at the Cameco Meewasin Skating Rink @ Nutrien Plaza, located in Kiwanis Park next to the historic Delta Hotels by Marriott Bessborough. The outdoor skating



rink has a cosy warm-up shelter, fire pit, washrooms and skates available to borrow.

The redeveloped **Optimist Hill Snow Park** opened in 2019. The winter recreation facility features tubing lanes, areas for tobogganing, downhill skiing and snowboarding and a terrain park with rails, boxes and jumps, and a magic carpet conveyor to carry people to the top of the hill. The next phase will include a chalet with concession counter and function rooms.

FROM FARM TO TABLE AND TAP

Visit these agri-tourism operations in Saskatoon and area to experience the bounty of the land on your plate and in your glass. Take a day trip and meet the farmers and producers who are working to bring your food and drink to table and tap.









Black Fox Farm & Distillery

245 Valley Road, Saskatoon Black Fox Farm & Distillery was started by John Cote and Barb Stefanyshyn-Cote with the intent of connecting people to agriculture. Growing 90 per cent of their ingredients on the farm, the Cotes harvest acres of fresh fruit, flowers and grains and distil it into award-winning gin, whisky and liqueurs.

Crossmount Cider Company

5 km S of Saskatoon on Hwy 219
Established in 2016, Crossmount Cider
Company has grown into the largest craft
cider company on the Prairies, producing
hard apple cider from 100 per cent Canadian
apples. Tour the 1,500-tree apple and 500tree pear orchard and taste its five delicious
flavours of cider.

Farm One Forty, near Vanscoy

21 km W of Saskatoon on Hwy 7 to Vanscoy, and 4 km S on Grid 762

Farm One Forty is all about connecting people with real food, and owners Arlie and Brett LaRoche do that by hosting farm-totable dinners and farm tour lunches. Tours offer a glimpse into daily life on the 140-acre farm. Guests can stroll out to the pasture, mingle with the animals and explore the gardens where most of the dinner ingredients are grown and harvested.

Odla

801 Broadway Avenue, Saskatoon
Odla – a unique, farm-direct restaurant and
market – is the brainchild of Arlie and Brett
LaRoche, who also own Farm One Forty.
The holistically managed farm supplies the
restaurant with its meat, grains, honey, fruits
and vegetables. Chef and co-owner Scott
Dicks creates seasonal menus inspired by the
fresh ingredients.

Petrofka Orchard, near Waldheim

54 km NW of Saskatoon on Hwy 12
Petrofka Orchard is a 19-hectare fruit orchard and vegetable farm located along the North Saskatchewan River. Its main fruit crops include apples, plums, sour cherries and haskaps, which produce over 58 gourmet products that can be purchased onsite at its Country Store. Enjoy a meal on the deck of the Prairie Sensation Café, or explore the 1.5 km of trails that lead to the riverfront beach or picnic spot.

SaskMade Marketplace

- Saskatchewan is located in the heart of North America, neighbouring the provinces of Manitoba and Alberta. To the south, it borders the American states of Montana and North Dakota. To the north is the Northwest Territories.

NATIONAL DISTINCTIONS

- Saskatchewan is home to Canada's only training academy for Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) recruits, in Regina.
- The T. rex skeleton, excavated near Eastend in 1994-95, is one of only 20 such discoveries in the world.
- The Athabasca Sand Dunes are the most northerly major sand dunes in the world, and among the largest in North America.
- The Canadian Light Source, a stadium-sized synchrotron light research facility, is located on the University of Saskatchewan campus in Saskatoon.
- Saskatchewan supplies more than a third of the world's total exported durum wheat and is the world's top exporter of lentils and dry peas.
- Twenty-one archaeological dig sites unveil the past at Wanuskewin, a national historic site that echoes the stories of Indigenous peoples who gathered, hunted and worshipped here as long as 6,000 years ago.
